



Welcome



Virginia Haworth-Galt outlines what you can expect from this year's conference including context, content and delivery methods.



Welcome to the 2011 FMS Conference, 'Fit to Face the Future – Fit to Shape the Future'. The Federation of Music Services is determined to ensure that Music Services are in the best possible shape to face the changes which are coming and that they are proactively involved in helping to shape the future music education landscape. We want to support Music Services in identifying, developing and sustaining key partnerships, ultimately supporting the music education of all children and young people.

The Conference has been designed to positively explore and practically address a number of key themes arising out of the Henley Review of Music Education including partnerships, transition, hubs, bid-writing, harnessing digital media and the role of Ofsted.

Day 1 of the conference seeks to underpin pragmatic skills and provide updated information for modern Music Services, equipping delegates for a journey into 2012 and beyond. Much of the content of the day is delivered by practical sessions, but it begins with keynote speech from Marcus du Sautoy and features an update from Dick Hallam, the National Music Education Grant Director.

Day 2 is our 'Partnership Day' and as we move towards hubs Music Services clearly

have a key role to play within partnerships across the wider cultural education sector. Kicking off with a thought provoking speech from Gavin Stride and followed by further presentations and showcases, delegates will hear from partner organisations from across the wider arts, music and cultural education sector. Music Services can find out about key developments and plans which may impact on their work and may influence their decisions relating to strengthening, entering or creating, robust and sustainable partnerships and collaborations.

As this is a conference aimed at music educators it has of course got a strong theme of music education reflected in speeches and workshops. Throughout the conference there will be a chance to see musical performances from children and young people supported by Music Services from the North West.

I am delighted that our programme includes contributions from: ABRSM; Arts Council England; Bates Wells and Braithwaite; Curious Minds; Laura Drane; Gigajam; Dick Hallam; The Hallé; Andy Hind; Music for Youth; Musical Bridges; Ofsted; Marcus du Sautoy; Spitalfields Music; Gavin Stride; Think Again Media; Voices Foundation; Yamaha; Youth Music. As always we have an exciting range of highly relevant trade exhibitors.

The conference also features a substantial input from Music Services themselves. **The Members' Voice** is an unparalleled resource and much wisdom, expertise and vision can be shared amongst colleagues via a number of conference sessions.

Succession planning is a vital part of running any effective business and modern Music Services need to ensure that the training and development needs of personnel moving into senior roles are addressed. This conference aims to support new and **Emergent Leaders** and there are sessions on both Friday and Saturday which are of particular relevance.

On Friday the conference programme is delivered partially via a programme of Workshops and Masterclasses. **Workshops** are practical sessions which feature Heads of Music Service giving practical advice and experiential guidance on a range of subjects. **Masterclasses** feature expert advice and guidance on topics from subject specialists. These are designed to give delegates a chance to gain robust insight and knowledge in a range of subjects.

For any delegate wishing to know more about **Trusts** there is both a Workshop and a Masterclass. Delegates have an opportunity to hear from Heads of Service about the practical realities of moving to Trust status and running a Trust and then receive outline legal advice about how to implement this change.

ABRSM have been a continued and highly valued supporter of FMS. On Saturday they are supporting our new **'In Conversation with...'** strand at this year's conference. This part of the conference aims to help keep Music Services fully engaged with key music education debates. 'In Conversation with...' is a series of chaired conversations between three professionals on a specific topic (pedagogy, partnerships, young people at risk) in front of an audience of conference delegates who have interest in this subject area. This is not a panel discussion, it is a conversation aiming to explore areas of this topic intelligently and drawing on personal and professional experience and expertise. Through this dialogue there may not be consensus and the conversationalists are not expected to know all the answers – but hopefully the outcome of the session will be that delegates will have had their own thought processes stimulated and engaged by the discussion.

In addition to the above programmed sessions, and subject to availability, delegates interested in having one-to-one support via a 'partnership surgery' with Marc Jaffrey (following the FMS Partnership Training delivered by Think Again in May) may sign up for a ½ hour session anytime during the conference.

I look forward to seeing you at the conference and I hope you find it interesting, useful and thought provoking.
